



Improving the Emergency Experience, Thanks to You

Donor-supported Emergency Department to open in 2025

St. Boniface Hospital's Emergency Department serves as the front door of the Hospital and, in many respects, the health-care system, says Dr. Harold Peters.

Peters has worked as a physician in the Emergency Department at St. B since 2017. "The first impressions of most patients and their family members are set in their experiences in our Emergency Department," he said.

"That shapes their experience of illness throughout their entire stay."

The populations the Emergency Department serves in Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario are growing. People are generally living longer, notes Peters. "So, disease is getting more complicated. The needs of the health-care system have been increasing significantly," he said.

Time and other factors have put pressure on the department, however. The Hospital's current Emergency Department was built in 1955 and has operated with minimal updates for almost 70 years.

"I can tell you our current infrastructure is overloaded. The building itself is relatively old, and that makes it difficult for us to manage increasingly complex issues with patients," Peters continued. Moving patients from the Emergency Department throughout the Hospital for diagnostics or treatment has become more difficult, owing to the aging facility, he added.

The redevelopment project currently underway at the Hospital will result in a modern space where Peters says he and his colleagues will be able to better offer compassionate, high-quality, advanced resuscitation and critical care to patients.

Because of Your Support, Patti Survived SCAD

Patti LeBlanc didn't think lifting a slow cooker would send her into an ambulance. But in December of 2015, that's just what happened.

LeBlanc, 49, was loading up her car for a church potluck when she was hit with alarming sensations. She felt as though an elephant was pressing on her chest, her chin was sore, and she had pain in her jaw. Suddenly, she felt her left arm tingling.

"I started thinking the worst about what this could be. I didn't know the signs of a heart attack," said LeBlanc. "At my age, why would I?"

LeBlanc was ultimately diagnosed with spontaneous coronary artery dissection (SCAD), which is a tear in the artery wall, reducing blood flow and often leading to a heart attack. "I was told as a SCAD survivor to take everything slowly, and to breathe," said LeBlanc. She knows how close she came to death.

Today, LeBlanc makes sure to cherish every moment. Each year, on the day of her heart attack, she reflects on what she was able to accomplish in the past year, including these in a letter to her care team.



"I want them to understand that because of their care, I'm still here. Because they saved my life, I was able to celebrate my granddaughter's first birthday. I was able to get back to running and doing what I love."

Truly Exceptional Emergency Care, Thanks to You



Last year, Réseau Compassion Network Board member Lisa Raven ended up in St. Boniface Hospital's Emergency Department for what she suspected was a stroke. St. B is one of Réseau Compassion Network's family of 13 service agencies working to serve Manitobans' needs across the continuum of care.

She was numb on one side, couldn't lift her arms above her head, and was worried. She headed to the Hospital, hoping for the best.

As an Indigenous woman, she felt a lot of support throughout her emergency care experience. Someone was always by her side, informing her and caring for her at each step. "It was so reassuring to have someone there with me," Raven said.

With staff regularly checking in on her, she was seen quickly by the emergency physician and sent for a more comprehensive MRI. They confirmed what she was experiencing was not a stroke, but acute migraine symptoms. Emergency Department staff promised to keep her under their watch until her symptoms were gone, and she felt well enough to go home.

Raven praised the Emergency Department staff for her exceptional care. "I really appreciated the communication and the care. The way I was treated and informed was really great," she remarked. "I often read about the bad experiences in health care, especially for Indigenous populations. But my experience was a really, really good one, and I think those need to be heard, too."
